

FOUR people were arrested as 100 demonstrators tried to storm a police station at Rochester, Kent, yesterday after a rally in which the organiser, Beffeshanger miner Bill Martin, was arrested.

He was believed to have a 10-year-old girl with him at the time.

And in Maltby, near Rotherham, South Yorks, a policeman was punched and four people were arrested after a mob of 20 attacked two off-duty

But a spokesman at Durham County Police H.Q. said a number of men had been arrested following incidents in the pit villages at Murton, Horden, Easington and Peterlee New Town.

The worst of the violence was believed to have been in Murton.

Mr. White said during the fighting roads were blocked off by police.

He said: "The troubles didn't have anything to do with the pit dispute or any police aggravation because they simply were not there when it happened.

They re beyond caring about.abstractions such as maintaining political equilibrium. These are unashamed authoritarians, elitists of a Social-Darwinist stamp, who have every intention of establishing their monetarist dream, irrelevant to the social cost. And far worse awaits in the wings. Sympathisers of a pure bloodied authoritarian state, sociobiologists, extreme racists. How long before they become mainstream conservatism.

So where in this panaramic view do we stand. We have no desire to return to the comfortable post-war consensus. It was people of our ilk that caused disturbance long before Maggie gained poer. Anyway, it is impossible to step backwards, the bridges have long been burnt. The whole world situation, the changes that capitalism is going through


frontation against the forces of order is the now excepted method of struggle by those denied political access. And also those increasing numbers that anarchically reject it.

We d like to see, among a host of likewise events, organised proletarian crime such as mass shop lifting. 
SHOPPING

STOP THE CITY

On September 27th the forth and hopefully the final stop the city demonstration took place in the city of London. The police had learned well the lessons from the other three and the day was more or less a total disaster with o over 470 arrests. It appeared however that unlike the police many demonstrators had ignored the lessons of the past making the polices job that much easier.

Many people went along without any actions planned and when they discovered that the police had blocked off the main assembly points (St Pauls & the Royal exchange) they were left wondering around without any clear ideas of what to do or where to go. There were also a large number of people who had made no attempt to disguise their appearance so presenting themselves as obvious targets for the police (I spoke to one punk who had been searched six times by midday!). A noticable style of dress also made it considerably more difficult to do






that there was no way th police were going to let this happen again. They opted for a saturation affect with well over 1000 cops on duty, they constantly harrased demonstrators by searching them and taking their names. They threatened to and indeed did arrest people for standing in groups of three or more and people were arrested for the most stupid reasons (i.e. carruing a banner, putting leaflets under car windsc en wipers, crossing a zebra crossing too slowly etc, etc). They also confiscated leaflets from anyone seen giving them out. The tactic of cutting off the main assembly points also had a tremendous effect this made it virtually impossible for people to congregate in large groups. Denied strength in numbers and the support this gave many people who might have done something had the circumstances been right did not.

It should be remembered however that the day was not a total failure, alot of people went along with actions planned and carried them out with little or no interfearence: -windows of banks were smashed, countless stink bombs set off, posh' cars attacked, roads blocked, police radios jammed and a police car paint bombed, etc etc Also the travelling of over 200 protestors from the city to exfe-


