### ANARCHISM (BRIEFLY)

Anarchism is revolutionary anti-state socialism. In practical terms, anarchists aim for the destruction of the power of the ruling class and of all relationships based on domination and submission. This means taking over our industries and communities and changing them to meet the needs of all, as well as the ecological needs of the environment. Without this takeover we can struggle within capitalism but never replace it.

Anarchism will be created by millions of people, not a dictatorial elite (we are not Marxist Leninists) and all will have their part to play in shaping it. Power will lie with the organisations thrown up by and for the revolution, not with the political parties who will try to dominate and destroy them.

The new society will not be born through abstract ideas, but will come out of the realities of struggle and the need for working class people to unite. Such struggle doesn't just involve resistance to ruling class power (strikes, mass protests and other forms of direct action), but also construction — the building of the new, locally based federal organisations (examples of which go from grass roots anti-poll tax groups to the miners' support groups of the 1984-85 strike), plus the forging of solidarity and the willingness to go further.

There is no truce in the class war. The only answer to ruling class power is continual and widening struggle — for social revolution and for anarchism.

The 56a Infoshop is at 56 Crampton Street, Elephant and Castle, London SE17 and is open Monday, Thursday and Friday from 3 - 7. See their entry in the periodicals list. Housmans Bookshop is at 5 Caledonian Road, Kings Cross, London N1 9DX and Compendium is at 234 Camden High Street, London NW1 8QS. There's space on page 2 of the Yearbook for the stamp of the shop which sold this copy and if it's been used then whoever it is ought to be able to get anarchist books for you. Any shop which has a reasonable stock of anarchist books, write and say you want to be in next year's edition of the Yearbook.

This is a major event in anarchist circles but the publication date of the Yearbook means it can't give the date of the current year's Fair. See the anarchist press for details, nearer the time.

The Anarchist Distribution Service sends out free material to class struggle groups around the country once a month or so. With a bit of luck this fills in some of the gaps between the three national groups. Send them a hundred copies of the leaflet you want sent out, plus a fiver for the

postage. Class struggle stuff only. Their address is PO Box 446, Sheffield, S1 1NY

Moving outside the anarchist ghetto there is the Anti-Nuclear Network, a direct action group whose address is c/o 265 Seven Sisters Road, Finsbury Park, London N4 2DE. The Stop the M11 campaign are currently at 66 Claremont Road, Leyton, London E11 4EE but may have been evicted by the time you read this. (It's a squat in the way of the M11.) But if they are evicted mail will be forwarded to the next address. Their phone number is 081 558 2638 and their fax is 081 558 1236. If any other groups whose aims are libertarian and who practice direct action want to be in the Yearbook then get in touch to see if they can be included next year.

Last of all, a special mention for South Bristol Anarchists whose address is PO Box 1076, Bristol BS99 1WF and who wish you to know that they were born out of the 1992 Hartcliffe riots and their main aim is to produce propaganda and distribute it on the working class estates of South Bristol. In 2 years they've put class struggle anarchist alternatives into the letter boxes of over 12,000 homes, concentrating on, among other things, antisocial crime, police harassment and murders, bailiffs and dodgy councillors. This has resulted in a lot of support from local communities plus local media attention.

### BUSINESS?

The Yearbook is aimed at individuals, letting them know what books have been published in the last year, what periodicals are being produced, and so on. Another aspect of anarchist activity is trade distribution (mostly to bookshops.) If you're a bookshop looking for anarchist titles to stock (or a group setting up a book stall) then the following organisations will supply material at trade terms. All the addresses are in the publishers list.

A Distribution (address as Rebel Press) are distributors of anarchist and situationist titles, especially those of Rebel Press and Spectacular Times. They are sole distributors in both cases, and also carry some titles from the US.

AK Distribution distribute their own AK Press titles and a lot else including Phoenix Press.

DS4A distribute music as well as literature.

Freedom Press distribute their own titles, plus a few others.

It's traditional for the Yearbook to make some grandiose claim that next year's edition will carry more and better information than the current one. So next year should see a much more informative section on trade distribution.

## PHOENIX PRESS

After the revolution money will either be abolished or will grow on trees, I forget which. In these decadent, pre-revolutionary times, however, printers want to be paid for their work. So if you want to see more anarchist books in print and don't mind putting your money where your mouth is, Phoenix Press has a loan system whereby money is collected in small sums until enough has been got to pay for the printing of a book. Over ten books have been printed using this system. The basic sum of money being asked for as a loan is currently £40. (It used to be less but that's inflation for you.) This sum has been chosen because it's slightly less than a week's full dole and therefore within the reach of most people. For the £40 loan you'll get a copy of the book for which the money was lent, plus a copy of the current Anarchist Yearbook. When enough books have been sold you'll be offered your loan back. (Remember that Phoenix is asking for loans, not gifts.) This takes ages and of course you'll be asked to continue the loan for another book.

The Phoenix loan system means you can help anarchist publishing without having to put up the full cost of a book (at least £2,000, a sum beyond the reach of most people). So if you think anarchist publishing is worth supporting, and can afford it, send a £40 loan to Phoenix Press at PO Box 824, London N1 9DL. Try and remember to include your name and address since these come in handy when sending you the book. The book for which loans are currently being sought is Turning Up the Heat: MI5 After the Cold War by Larry O'Hara. This is an attack on our unelected and unaccountable secret state. (See the write-up on page 8.) By the time you read this it will have been printed but lend the money anyway. There's a book every year and once you've lent the £40 you'll get a copy of each year's book.

## A (VERY) BRIEF HISTORY OF ANARCHISM

Anarchy means society without government and anarchism is the movement that's trying to get us there. It's usually thought that government is needed to keep order, to stop the strong preying on the weak, and that anarchy would mean chaos. This is the opposite of the truth. The government are the strong preying on the weak (ie us), and anarchism is an attempt to get the bastards off our backs. Look at yourself. Are you only stopped from anti-social crime by fear of being caught by the police? Or are you a normal person who doesn't need threats to make them behave in a responsible way? It's true that anti-social criminals are a problem, and the worst of them are the government.

Resistance to government is as old as government itself. Human beings have been around, in one form or another for several million years. For nearly all this time we lived in small tribes that roamed freely around the planet. Life in such societies wouldn't have been perfect but it must have seemed so to those who were attacked by the first governments. Government started around 7,000 years ago in the Middle East. One group enslaved another and forced them to work for them. (See Against His-story, Against Leviathan by Fredy Perlman for an account of how this may have happened.) The murders, abductions and tortures needed to turn free people into slaves are usually referred to as civilisation, or progress, lies to hide the reality of an oppressive system that has slowly spread over the whole world. Today, here in the West, social conditions are far removed from the slavery of the early days but the central element of compulsion remains, disguised by a very competent propaganda system, just as slavery was hidden by euphemisms like civilisation.

As already stated, resistance to government is as old as government itself. A combination of flight and fight was used for thousands of years but today government has spread all over the world and there's nowhere left to run to. The anarchist movement is a new form of fight that started in the middle of last century in Western Europe as a reaction to the emerging world system of imperialism, industrialisation, the nation-state, and the conquest and colonisation of all of the non-industrialised countries. Anarchism's first major thinker was Pierre Joseph Proudhon but later developments make it more sensible to start with Michael Bakunin, the founder of the modern anarchist movement.

Bakunin was born in Russia in the early 1800s, the son of a wealthy landowner. As a young man he resigned his commission as an army officer and went to the West. He took part in the revolutions of 1848 and 1849, was captured, and spent the next six years in prison, mostly in Russia. He was then exiled to Siberia but escaped after a few years, returning to the West. Here he returned to revolutionary politics and started to develop his anarchist ideas. He advocated revolution, the abolition of government, and the remaking of society from the bottom up, with federalism, rather than centralism, as a means of co-ordination and organisation. He and his followers joined the International Working Men's Association and came into conflict with the authoritarian socialist Karl Marx. Now Bakunin made his famous prophecy, which was proved correct fifty years later, that seizure of state power by the Marxists would not lead to the disappearance of government and the emergence of a free society, (which is what the Marxists claimed) but "would be nothing else. . . than a new form of very hard slavery for the proletariat."

Bakunin's thought is flawed in many ways. For a start he never suggested any method of organisa-

tion other the secret societies which had been forced upon those working in dictatorships like Tsarist Russia. This would be put right when the anarcho-syndicalist movements emerged towards the end of the century but for the moment Bakunin left an organisational vacuum. As a hangover from his past he advocated an "invisible dictatorship" of anarchist revolutionaries, not recognising that authoritarian means do not lead to libertarian goals. He had already pointed this out when criticising Marx but lacked the insight to apply it to his own ideas. His anti-semitism, inspired by his dislike of Marx, also has to be rejected. But Bakunin's life was drawing to a close and he never got rid of the contradictions in his thought. In late 1870 he tried to start a revolution in Lyons but unsuccessfully. (Six months later Paris explodedin the Paris Commune but that's another story.) In 1872 Marx managed to get Bakunin expelled from the International Working Men's Association on trumped-up charges. The next year Bakunin tried to start a revolution in Bologna but that too failed. It was Bakunin's last major act, he died three years later.

Futile acts of insurrection and individualist terror now wasted the time of the anarchist movement until the emergence of anarchosyndicalist unions, particularly in Latin countries. These were revolutionary unions which rejected parlia-mentary politics and aimed at social revolution to be started by a general strike. Crucially they consisted of the workers in particular industries, that is, they weren't led by outside intellectuals like Bakunin or Marx. The most powerful of the anarcho-syndicalist movements was in Spain and in 1936 it came closer to achieving a free society than anyone else before or since. But before that there was a disaster for the revolutionary movement. In Russia Marxists seized power.

In 1905 an unsuccessful revolution had seen a new form of organisation, soviets. These were councils formed of workers or peasants or soldiers spontaneously set up to organise the defence of the revolution. Twelve years later in 1917 the Communists were to seize power under the slogan "All power to the soviets". In fact they took over the soviets, perverting them from their original aim, and destroyed by force those that resisted. The Marxist takeover of the 1917 revolution was completed in 1921 when the revolt against their dictatorship at the naval fortress of Kronstadt was defeated and when the Ukranian peasant army of Nestor Makhno was also beaten. Bakunin's gloomy prediction came true and the world revolutionary movement was largely hijacked by the new ruling class in Russia. For years the false glamour of the Russian Revolution meant that many revolutionaries in the West identified their cause with that of the Communist dictatorship in the East.

One area where the revolutionary movement stayed independent of the Marxist illusion in Russia was Spain. Bakunin's influence had always been strong here and after the First World War the world's largest anarcho-syndicalist movement, the CNT, developed. For years they agitated and fought, spreading libertarian ideas among Spanish workers and peasants. In 1936 General Franco led a military rebellion against the elected government. It was initially defeated in many areas of Spain and where the anarchists were numerous there was a far-reaching collectivisation of farms and industry under workers' control. But slowly the revolution was defeated. The CNT leaders, recognising their movement to be a minority, fatally compromised their principles and entered the Republican government. Meanwhile the Spanish Communist Party, acting as agents of Stalin's dictatorship, stabbed the revolution in the back, returning farms from collectivisation to their former owners, arresting and killing anarchist

militants in industrial areas. The revolution which had stopped the military uprising was converted into a conventional war which was lost in 1939. Spain was now subjected to Franco's barbarism.

What now? If anarchism is to be judged by its results then it's simple. We've failed. Neither we nor anyone else have been able to set up a free society. With the benefit of hindsight it is easy to see that 1936 was the high water point of anarcho-syndicalism. Since the destruction of the CNT in Spain anarcho-syndicalism has never been able to re-establish itself as a mass movement. The social conditions that made the CNT possible have changed and, if we are serious about our politics, we have to adapt to our new circumstances and work out why (so far) it's not been possible to build another mass anarchist movement. Only half the old ideas were right and we must supplement them with new ones. Whatever the future brings, one thing is certain. As long as there is power, there will be resistance to it.


