

Sometimes it seems like having an Anarchist Bookfair is fiddling while Rome burns? Over the past 12 months we've seen occupations, blockades and strikes, and even, in France, boss-napping. Greek youth revolt. Israeli tanks pound Gaza. In London the police kill lan Tomlinson and think they can get away with it. So what good is a bookfair?

Anarchism is about fighting back. But it's not mindless knee jerk sloganeering. Resistance doesn't just happen - people build it and think about it. We don't need to be told what to do but we do need to work it out together.

The London Anarchist Bookfair is a space for anarchist groups and revolutionaries from all over the country and beyond to do this. Like it or not, it's also a place for people new to the anarchist movement, or just interested, to find more out about anarchist ideas. So, best behaviour, then.

This year there are meetings with activists from struggles here in the UK and from around the world. There are talks and films about the past and meetings to plan resistance and organisation

in the future.

Stalls are in the People's Palace and the Octagon Room. Also in the People's Palace are meetings in the Skeel Room and Small Lecture Theatre, films in the second Lecture Theatre and Cabaret in the drama room. Most of the rest of the meetings are in the basement below the Octogan Room. Because there has been such a high demand for meetings this year, we have booked two extra rooms in the Physics Building which is on the other side of the grassed area outside the People's Palace. The creche is in the Boiler Room – around the back of the People's Palace and the older kids space is in FB1- downstairs from the Octagon Room. There is a cafe area next to the Octogan room. (There's a map to help you at the back of this programme.)

As we are back in East London we're using this stability to build on the success of the past couple of years - with more meetings and more stalls. We're also trying to make the bookfair more accessible (see page 4). Finally, no programme intro would be complete without an appeal for money. The bookfair is put on by a small collective and we need all the help we can get to make sure we break even and do it next year bigger and better.



We've tried to make the bookfair more accessible for deaf and disabled comrades so have made some changes to how it's organised this year:

### Everyone

\*We have set some time in-between meetings so that comrades with limited mobility can get to them on time and any support needed can be set up. Please stick to meeting times so that this works.

\*Please be aware that some seats in the meeting rooms have been reserved. These are for comrades with limited mobility or who or other support at any point during the day please also come to the information desk to organise.

\*If you are deaf or blind and have brought a guide dog please come and tell us if you need anything for them.

\*The whole venue is wheelchair accessible but some areas require lift-passes so please come and pick these up if needed. There is a map on page 23 showing wheelchair accessible routes around the campus, or ask at the info desk if you need directions.

\*We have reduced the use of rooms that are not on the ground floor but if you have limited mobility, please see the map to see where the nearest lifts and stairs are. We have also tried to improve signage around the bookfair to reduce unnecessary walking but please ask at the information desk if you require any help getting around. The main rest area is in the Octogan, as it was last year.

### 12 noon - 1.30pm Fighting the Fash - from 1945 to the present day

Returning home from a bitter war in 1945, Jewish veterans were appalled by the obscenity of Mosley resurrecting his new Nazis with its old hat demonisation of the cowardly blackmarket Jews. Morris Beckman talks about the ferocious "no quarter" assault which the 43 Group applied to utterly destroy Britain's post war fascists. ### 3pm - 3.50pm Tarnac 9

In November 2008, French police arrested around twenty people, mostly from Tarnac, a small village in central France. Nine were then charged under anti-terrorist legislation in connection with the sabotage of train lines. While very little evidence was presented against them, the arrest proved to be clearly politically motivated. The Tarnac 9 were mostly prosecuted for their alleged authorship of a book, The Coming Insurrection, as well as for being associated with a movement that the scare-mongering government and media loosely termed "anarchoautonomous". Both in France and internationally a strong movement emerged to support them and in defence of civil liberties. The meeting includes members of the main French support committee and will be the opportunity to discuss state repression of political activism in France, the UK or elsewhere.

### I I am - I I.50am Challenging racism in the anarchist spaces

We all have racism socialised into us. It may be mostly unconscious, but it has an effect which has an impact on how people of colour (POC) are able to participate equally in anarchist spaces. POC often speak with anger at how marginalised they are in this context. This workshop will look at some of the theory around how oppression operates, how we take part in it, and what concrete steps we can take to help dismantle it.

### Ipm - 1.50pm Resisting NETCU, Fighting FIT

In the past year or so, the Forward Intelligence Teams (FIT) have begun to be effectively challenged in their attempts to repress dissent. Meanwhile the National Extremism Tactical Coordination Unit (NETCU), designed to combat the animal rights movement, has been operating increasingly as a new political police force aimed at countering any effective resistance to corporate power. One of NETCU's strengths has been the seeding of negative stories in the media in order to limit public support for radical movements.

This workshop organised by Corporate Watch, NETCU Watch and FIT Watch will discuss how we can continue to challenge FIT teams and begin to resist NETCU's attack on our movements.




### 5pm - 6pm Gustav Landauer, Erich Mühsam, and the German Revolution of 1918-19

Gustav Landauer (1870-1919) and Erich Mühsam (1878-1934) arguably remain Germany's most influential anarchists. Both were key figures in the Bavarian Council Republic of 1919, the most ambitious attempt by left-wing radicals to create an egalitarian and socialist society on the ashes of the German Empire. English language material, in particular primary texts by Landauer, Mühsam, and fellow radicals of the era, are scarce. PM Press has now announced a series of publications providing sources that have long remained unavailable. An extensive Gustav Landauer reader will be published in March 2010. An Erich Mühsam reader and a reader on radical currents during the German Revolution will follow in subsequent years.

Gabriel Kuhn will give an introduction to Gustav Landauer and Erich Mühsam, discuss German anarchism, and outline the PM Press projects.

## The struggle against Shell in Mayo - a decade of resistance

For the last decade residents of Erris in Mayo have been fighting attempts by Shell to impose a dangerous experimental gas pipeline on their community. They have been joined by campaigners from all over Ireland opposed to the billions of euro of gas and oil being handed over to the energy corporations by the Irish state. Over the summer the Irish state deployed 300 police, 2 Navy gunboats and Airforce planes to back up 200 private security in protecting a key phase of the project. This presentation explains the key events and causes of this struggle. using this meeting as a launch for these.

The situation in Calais reflects a current escalation of repression against migrants and Roma people across Europe, including the recent destruction by police of a 13 yr old refugee camp in Greece, and mob attacks on Roma camps in Italy. Jenny Morgan's film presents the ever growing rift between South Africa's economically marginalised and its government. Members of Abahlali baseMjondolo, a shack dwellers' movement opposing the removal of residents of informal settlements to new housing outside the city of Durban, argue that a Slum Clearance Act, will end their already limited access to economic opportunities. At the heart of Abahlali's struggle is the fight for meaningful citizenship rights for South Africa's poor majority.

### The Angry Brigade - The Spectacular Rise and Fall of Britain's First Urban Guerilla Group

The Angry Brigade was a militant British libertarian group active during the politically intense period of the late 60s and early 70s. Inspired by Spanish anarchism and the Situationists, they opposed repressive regimes and materialist society by taking symbolic militant actions against property. This is the Gordon Carr film from 1973 along with a shorter documentary on the Person Unknown trial. Where the state failed to railroad anarchists including ABC activists for "conspiring with persons unknown, at places unknown" to overthrow society. Jake Prescott - who served the longest sentences of the Angry Brigade defendants - died earlier this year.

### Notes from the Borderland issue 9 hopefully out for this Book-Fair


