Delivering an event of this scale is a mammoth task and the Pride Committee deserves congratulation. More photos on the inside pages.










NADIA AT SILVER PRIDE

On Friday October 4th Nadia Whittome, MP for Nottingham East, has agreed to meet the group and talk about issues of mutual concern. Nadia was presented with the "Unsung Hero of the Year Award" at the DIVA Awards 2023 and a further award at the Rainbow Heritage Celebration and Awards evening in February this year.


CONNECT CAFÉ CLOSES



LOOKING BACK

60 YEARS OF THE NOTTINGHAM "SCENE"



CJ DeBarra's forthcoming two volumes on the Nottingham LGBT+ venues from the 1960s onwards will appear in February 2025. The books have been assembled using interviews with about 150 people.

CJ gave a whistlestop tour of some of the highlights at Nottingham Central Library on August 1st. There were the venues which many of the audience remembered - fondly or otherwise - such as Part Two, Infinity and Gatsbys, but also those which exist in name only (like the Napier) as no visual records remain.

There was speculation about the location of the earliest club supposedly above a pie shop in the Lace Market. Was this the place?

"All across town there was only one nightclub and you had to queue to get in and they didn't always serve alcoholic liquor.

It seemed to depend. It was a little place, tiny with low beams, in the lace market district, above a pie shop, up some stairs.

You needed an introduction, or to be a known and fancied/wanted face."

Many of the people responsible for setting up these venues are no longer with us - people like Frank Turner and Jimmy Hetherington - but fortunately CJ was able to speak to others: Ross Smith of Part Two, Debbie Law of the New Foresters and Ken Metcalf of Shades.

Local newsletters and magazines (Gay Nottingham, Metrogay, Outright - all produced by Richard McCance - GEM, Chimaera and QB) often helped to illuminate what was going on at a particular time and also what hit the headlines in the national press.



We were reminded about those national issues which had repercussions locally - in particular AIDS and Section 28.



For Nottingham it may be that the era of the big club has passed, but there is some compensation in the increasing number of "pop ups".

Attendees were also able to view one of the memorial AIDS quilts which was loaned from London.



RAINBOW ROAD REPAINT



The 2019 rainbow crossings in Hockley had started to look a bit worn, but they were revived in time for Pride and with the addition of some colours from the progressive rainbow flag.



Should we be surprised that some black tyre marks appeared soon after the renovation? Another reason why Pride is still relevant and necessary.



TRAMBOW

Trambow is the nickname for the Nottingham Tram company's newly painted rainbow tram, which was unveiled by Alstom on July 8th.



Various Alstom vehicles carry a 'trainbow', including EMR's Class 158 Express Sprinter 158773, Avanti West Coast's Class 390 Pendolino 390119 and West Midlands Railway's Class 730 Aventra 730018 – named 'Hurst Street' in honour of Birmingham's Gay Village. Several of the 147 Alstombuilt trams for Manchester Metrolink also carry a 'trambow'.

UNDER THE RAINBOW EXHIBITION



The **Under the Rainbow** exhibition took place late July/early August at Broadway Cinema. It was organised by the Sparrow's Nest library and archive with help from the People's Histreh radical history group.

The Sparrow's Nest looks after tens of thousands of books, journals, pamphlets, zines, leaflets, posters and other items which includes local radical and LGBTQ+ history. You can download their archive from https://www.thesparrowsnest.org.uk/



The main elements of the exhibition were focused around Nottingham's LGBTQ+ newsletters and magazines from the 1970s onwards as well as photographs from Nottingham Pride taken by local photographer Alan Lodge. (See bottom of page)

Many of the extracts were from newsletters produced in the 1980s and 1990s by Richard McCance. These were Gay Nottingham, Metrogay and Outright. Richard (in the yellow tabard) was present at the opening of the exhibition.

Videos produced by Richard and his husband, the late Chris Richardson, were played. One video related to the notorious trial of John Clarkson - sent to prison at the age of 19 because he was gay. John later became chairperson of what is now Notts LGBT+ Network. Reading some of the display reminded us that Richard was Nottingham's first "out" councillor - and, we believe, only the second "out" councillor in the whole of the UK.

On show was the terrifying papier mache head of Margaret Thatcher produced and regularly worn by Chris Richardson.












































LOOKING FURTHER BACK

THE BUGGERY LAW

In 1533 Henry VIII introduced the Buggery Law.

Offenders being hereof convicted by verdict confession or outlawry shall suffer such pains of death and losses and penalties of their good chattels debts lands tenements and hereditaments.

The section in italics is what really interested Henry. He used the law aggressively in order to accumulate the land, the buildings and the money.



In 1806 there were more executions for sodomy than for murder.

In 1836 the last British execution for sodomy took place - though the law was not changed until 1861.

GROSS INDECENCY

1885 The offence of "Gross indecency between males" was introduced to cover all gay sex other than anal intercourse. Lesbians were not included.

"Any male person who, in public or private, commits, or is a party to the commission of, or procures, or attempts to procure the commission by any male person of, any act of gross indecency shall be guilty of misdemeanour, and being convicted shall be liable at the discretion of the Court to be imprisoned for any term not exceeding two years, with or without hard labour."

This was known as the Labouchere Amendment after the MP **Henry Du Pré Labouchère** (see below) who introduced it.



in 1895 **Oscar Wilde** became the most prominent victim of Labouchère's amendment. Wilde spent two years in prison at hard labour.

The law was often described as "the blackmailer's charter". Many other gay men shared Wilde's fate, while countless thousands silently suffered extortion and the mental torture brought by fear of exposure. Many chose suicide over arrest and exposure.

The Labouchère amendment became a device for perpetrating fear and hatred of male homosexuality for more than 80 years. It was removed from the statute books in 2004, but still left thousands of gay men with criminal records for something which was no longer an offence.

GROUP OF THE DAY



Nottingham Hyking Dykes is a friendly group of lesbians who meet every month, usually every third Sunday. They normally walk come rain or shine - 6-8 miles in the Peak District, Leicestershire or Nottinghamshire, and always end with a tea shop or pub!



The group has been active for over 33 years and all the walks are led by volunteers During the early Covid period they ingeniously followed the rules by walking in socially distanced groups of 6.

For those who have transport problems in getting to the starting point of the walk, transport from a convenient location can be arranged by contacting the organisers in advance.

Well behaved dogs (and their owners) are welcome but dogs must be kept on a lead where necessary.

If you want to bring children then check the nature of the walk with the leader and you must accept responsibility if they can't keep up the pace.

MISCELLANY

NEW GOVERNMENT, NEW POLICIES?

The MPs. Labour's 46 out LGBTQ+ MPs represent by far the largest party cohort of any parliament, anywhere in the world. They constitute 11.2 per cent of the governing party. All 23 incumbent Labour MPs were re-elected alongside 23 new LGBTQ+ Labour MPs.

The Green Party Co-Leader, Carla Denyer (Bristol Central) - see right - is the first out LGBTQ+ Green MP and first out party leader in the House of Commons.



What about the policies?

Conversion therapy. Six years ago the Tories said they would ban conversion therapy. They didn't. Banning it is a Labour policy and would seem to be an "easy win."

The **aggravating factor**. Hate crimes based on race or religion are automatically escalated to an aggravated offence. This means that the judge can impose a heavier sentence. At the moment, LGBT+ based hate crimes can be considered an "aggravated offence" but it is not automatic. Labour has said that all forms of hate crime will be aggravated offences.

The **Gender Recognition Act**. In the party's election manifesto, Labour promised to "modernise, simplify and reform the intrusive and outdated gender-recognition law to a new process". For this, we need action and we need to see the small print.

Other issues.

Trans guidance for schools. A consultation document was issued in December 2023. Many legal experts, including the Department for Education's own lawyers, believe that the guidance set out in the document may be illegal. The new government needs to provide firm clarification for teachers who otherwise will be treading a minefield.

Reducing trans waiting lists. Waiting times for first appointments at gender identity clinics are huge – in some areas more than five years long – and the government should act rapidly to bring these down.

In the last years of the Conservative government several MPs weaponised trans issues and used them as political footballs following what might be called the "Daily Mail agenda". Suella Braverman's idea that gender neutral toilets should be banned in new government buildings was one of several such notions. We hope to see the end to this anti-trans grandstanding.



Recently the **Nottingham Refugee Forum** has substantially developed its support services for LGBT+ people. It can now:

- Signpost to LGBTQ+ services in Nottingham
- Signpost to sexual health services
- Provide referrals to LGBTQ+ safe housing
- Provide referrals for LGBTQ+ specialist legal support
- Support reporting hate crime, bullying and harassment
- Provide general advocacy for LGBTQ+ asylum seekers and refugees
- Provide LGBTQ+ community group meetings once every month
- Provide wellbeing checks.

BLOOD STOCKS CRITICALLY LOW

"Blood stocks are critically low" says the NHS blood donation website. "We need your help now more than ever to keep providing lifesaving blood to the NHS. Please book an appointment."

The health service issued an appeal for people with O-type blood to come forward, however some gay and bisexual men are still unsure about the rules about blood donation in the UK. Google searches for "can gay people donate blood UK" spiked after the announcement. Here are the latest rules.



Now, any men who have sex with men and are in monogamous long-term relationships, or have been with their sexual partner for more than three months, can donate blood.


The NHS rules state: "Men who have sex with men and who have had the same partner for 3 months or more and meet our other eligibility criteria are able to give blood.

"Anyone who has had anal sex with a new partner or multiple partners in the last three months, regardless of their gender or their partner's gender, must wait 3 months before donating."

The NHS say that the 3-month wait is to "reduce the risk of any very recently acquired infections not being detected on screening and further tests. This applies to all donors whose partners may be at a higher risk of blood-borne infections."


Donors are also asked questions about past sexually transmitted infections and any drug use during sex.

"If you are taking pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) or post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) you will be unable to give blood. If you stop taking PrEP or PEP, you will need to wait 3 months before you can give blood."
