
He is a witty chronicler of contemporary life with all its follies, excesses, and delusions, but his wry observations are tempered by humour and compassion.

THE NEW FOURTH TRAFALGAR SQUARE PLINTH



Teresa Margolles, from Mexico, is former forensic pathologist who often makes art using the physical traces of the deceased, especially victims of murder. Her sculpture for the fourth plinth in Trafalgar Square takes its form from a gruesome Aztec masterpiece, a 15th-century tower of skulls known as the Huey Tzompantli that was excavated in Mexico City.

Margolles finds in that eerie Mesoamerican monument the inspiration for her memorial to her friend Karla, a transgender woman who was murdered in Juárez in 2015. It is also a memorial to all transgender victims of violence: 726 people from trans and non-binary communities in Britain and Mexico offered their faces to be cast in this modernday tzompantli.

NADIA VISITS SILVER PRIDE


READING PROUD



A record turn out at Silver Pride welcomed Nottingham MP **Nadia Whittome**. In a wide ranging afternoon of questions and answers some of the topics which were touch upon included:

Banning conversion therapy; the worrying rise of the far right in Europe; anti-trans propaganda; looking back to Section 28; the "right to buy" for council houses; her experiences as an "out" MP and Keir Starmer's new glasses.

YET ANOTHER AWARD



The **Best Bar None** awards celebrate and recognise the city's best pubs, bars, clubs, restaurants, and entertainment venues. This year they were awarded on September 3rd at the Pitcher and Piano and, for the second year running, the Lord Roberts was runner up.



Five Leaves Bookshop organised its 3rd "Reading Proud" session at Central Library on October 5th.

The event started with **Gareth Peter** and **Troy Jenkinson** (see below) talking about their picture books for children. Both mentioned their experiences of the effect of Section 28 on LGBT+ schoolchildren and how the lack of relevant LGBT+ themed literature for young people spurred their writing.





One's appreciation of Dolly Parton was again reinforced by hearing that she has sent 7000 copies of Gareth's book to UK schoolchildren.



Sacha Coward's book "Queer as Folklore" sets out centuries of storytelling which make it clear that the Pride displays of fairy wings, unicorns, mermaids tails and tridents are queer symbols with historic roots.

Musih Tedji Xaviere (These letters end in tears) and **lqbal Hussain** (Northern Boy) described coming of age fiction from the perspective of a black woman and a Muslim man.

LP Mills and Ellie Sharpe explored sci-fi/speculative fiction and the afternoon ended with a session on the poetry of Lalah-Simone Springer and Olivia Douglas.

FAREWELL TO DREW & AARON



They say "It's been a decision we've been trying to avoid, but for our mental health, sanity & future, me and Aaron have decided to leave the pub trade and move onto pastures new. It has been the most rewarding, challenging, exciting, tiring, emotional rollercoaster we've ever been on and we have loved every bit of it. Now we just want our own home, a 9-5 job and to spend time with each other."

THAI-ING THE KNOT



In June Thailand's senate passed the final reading of a historic marriage equality bill, paving the way for the country to become the first in south-east Asia to recognise same-sex marriage.

The bill had to wait for the Royal assent before coming into law and on Sept. 25th that assent was given. "Congratulations to everyone's love," says prime minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra.


"Today we are not only getting to write our names in marriage certificates but we are also writing a page in history," says Ann Chumaporn, co-founder of the Bangkok Pride "That tells us that love never sets a condition of who we were born to be."

THE PERSONAL IS POLITICAL



CJ DeBarra (see above) continue their research into Nottingham's LGBT+ history with this talk on queer activism. From The Campaign for Homosexual Equality (CHE) and the Gay Liberation Front (GLF) in the 1960s to AIDS activism of the 1980s to gay marriage protests in the 2010s, Nottingham's activists have often been at the forefront of change.

GLF was launched in the UK by Rob Mellors (below right) who was himself from Nottingham. One of Nottingham GLF's most notable successes were the performances of "Gay Street Theatre" which they put on in cooperation with the Nottingham CHE group.



The talk included mention of the formation in 1975 of Nottingham Gay Switchboard. This was a product of the CHE group which found that many of those who contacted it had "problems" ... problems at work, problems at home, problems with feeling isolated.

The helpline that CHE set up in 1975 was one of the earliest in the UK (Edinburgh and London were first). Many of those 1970s helplines have since closed. Nottingham Gay Switchboard is now Notts LGBT+ Network and is still going after 49 years.

The 1980s saw the devastation wrought by AIDS and how local men and (particularly) women provided information and support. That decade also brought Thatcher's Section 28.



LOOKING FURTHER BACK

LESBIANS EXIST!

The 1885 Gross Indecency law only applied to menpossibly thanks to Queen Victoria. In 1921 MP **Frederick Macquisten** argued that lesbian acts should be criminalized. He said:

"These moral weaknesses date back to the very origin of history, and when they grow and become prevalent in any nation or in any country, it is the beginning of the nation's downfall. The falling away of feminine morality was to a large extent the cause of the destruction of the early Grecian civilisation".




This proposal failed and **Lord Birkenhead** (pictured above) the then Lord Chancellor argued that 999 women out of a thousand had "never even heard a whisper of these practices". The gist of his argument being "don't give women ideas".

Marguerite Radclyffe-Hall was an English poet and author of eight novels, including the lesbian classic **The Well of Loneliness.**


The Well of Loneliness became the target of a campaign by the editor of the Sunday Express newspaper, who wrote "I would rather give a healthy boy or a healthy girl a phial of prussic acid than this novel." He said this is "A Book That Must Be Suppressed."

It was banned in 1928, when a British court judged it obscene because it defended "unnatural practices between women", but publicity over The Well of Loneliness's legal battles increased the visibility of lesbians, though Its role in promoting images of lesbians as "mannish" or cross-dressed women has also been controversial.



The publisher **Jonathan Cape** announced that he had stopped publication, but he secretly leased the rights to Pegasus Press, a publisher in France. Pegasus Press started shipping its edition to London. Sales were brisk, but the reappearance of *The Well* on bookshop shelves soon came to the attention of the Home Office. On Oct. 3rd 1928 a warrant was issued for the book to be seized

The fact that lesbians and lesbian sex weren't recognised by the law could be advantageous as well as marginalising. Some women took advantage of the law's neglect and published **Arena Three**, the first British lesbian magazine. This first appeared in 1963, before the change in the law.



GROUD OF THE DAY

SILVER PRIDE

The old song says "Nobody loves a fairy when they're forty". Who loves gay/bi men when they are 55 or older?

The "gay scene" has always been youth orientated and older men may feel out of place there. The health (and sometimes financial) issues which come with getting older impact on socialising and circles of friends made when younger shrink or sometimes disappear altogether.

Silver Pride was set up in 2016 in collaboration with Age UK to provide a regular social outlet for gay/bi men who are 55 or older.



At first, the monthly meetings were held at the Age UK premises on Shakespeare Street with a charge of just £1/person as a contribution to tea/coffee etc.

In 2020 Covid caused a halt in the meetings. When people felt comfortable with restarting, the group learned that Age UK had closes its premises. Though Age UK still publicises the group, Silver Pride is now essentially independent.

A search for a new base led first to a comfortable room in Cobden Place and when this became unavailable the group moved to the International Community Centre.

Both of these venues naturally charged for use of their rooms, so it was greatly appreciated when the Health Shop offered a room for free. What does Silver Pride do?

The meetings at the Health Shop on the first Friday of the month (2-4pm) include things like talks/ discussions either from guest speakers or based on the interests of the group's members as well as quizzes, short films and general conversations.

After the meetings some people will take the short walk to the Lord Roberts.

The fact that the group fits a specific demographic has occasionally been useful. A PhD student from Trent University who is researching provisions for LGBT+ people in care homes has discussed the concerns members might have over requiring "care". A legal expert has dealt with issues such as wills and enduring power of attorney. CJ Debarra has spent a session with the group gathering reminiscences about Nottingham's "gay scene" for their forthcoming books.

Meetings outside the Health Shop have involved barbecues, picnics, bowling, theatre visits, a trip to Green's Windmill and more.

This year a second regular strand has developed. On the third Friday of the month there is now a short walk starting at the Health Shop. On one occasion this was converted into a cycle ride.

There are also opportunities for "extras" which may involve a few of the group organising additional activities. Examples of this is include when six or seven members got together to go on a trip to Sitges and when a group of members who would otherwise spend Christmas alone came together for a Christmas party.

In 2020, Silver Pride was one of the recipients of an award at the annual Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage Celebration and Awards evening - see below.



MISCELLANY



LGBT HERO is the national health and wellbeing charity for LGBTQ+ people supporting over 100,000 people a month.

Their website provides masses of information on a range of topics such as: health issues; hate crime; domestic abuse; relationships; your legal rights; gender identity as well as signposting to numerous support services They are, however, based in London, but one set of useful services is not geographically focused. These are the "Online Hangouts" for people aged over 50.

NEW SEXUAL HEALTH SERVICES

From October 1st people living in Nottingham and Nottinghamshire will now be able to benefit from a one-stop-shop sexual health service.

The new service will ensure everyone has access to the same level of service, regardless of where they live. Nottingham University Hospitals NHS Trust (NUH) will deliver the service in partnership with Sherwood Forest Hospitals NHS Trust (SFHT), and supported by a health provider, Preventx.

There will be a single brand, a new website, online testing and clinic-based services, with health promotion and outreach across the city and county, which will make accessing care easier.

A single, dedicated website will enable people to access services more easily -- including GPs, pharmacies, and other relevant services - and they will be able to choose face-to-face appointments, walk-ins, or online consultations.

As Sexual Health Services operate under selfreferral, residents are asked to access the service by:

The service will operate 6 days per week with extended opening times across the 3 hub sites.

The service will operate from hubs at following sites:

- Retford Hospital


There will also be community clinics in many of the existing locations in community health centres, or collocating with GP practices. These include:

SMALL GRANTS FOR LGBT GROUPS



Grants are available for groups who aren't already funded to specifically benefit the LGBT+ community. Your project or activity should benefit a minimum of 70% LGBT+ people.

Grants of up to £400 will usually be allocated, with an additional discretionary £200 available. The board meets bi-monthly to review applications. For full details go to

LGBT+ AWARENESS TRAINING

Do you belong to an organisation, a company, a group that would benefit from LGBT+ awareness training or would like to have a presentation on aspects of LGBT+ history?

When Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage was set up in 2008 with a grant from the Heritage Lottery, part of its remit was to provide regular training. In the last sixteen years training and presentations have been provided for over one hundred organisations and groups. They include:

- 6 hospitals
- 8 health-related organisations
- 5 care homes
- 5 housing organisations
- 10 schools/colleges
- 3 universities
- Notts Sexual Violence Service
- Notts Police and both local councils

Between 2014 and 2020, the former Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping supported numerous training sessions which included a focus on hate crime against LGBT+ people.

The main elements of the training are:

- Getting the terminology right what the "words" mean .. and which words not to use
- Homophobia, biphobia, transphobia: what they are. their frequency, their causes and the effects they have
- Homophobia, biphobia & transphobia in a wider context of general prejudice against minorities
- Myths and stereotypes
- Negative laws and the more recent positive changes in the law.
- "Coming out": what it means; what it's like to be "stuck in the closet" and what happens when you come out

There can be an additional focus on issues such as

- Health issues and LGBT+ people's interaction with health care providers
- Supporting victims of LGBT+ hate crimes; why these crimes are under-reported and how reporting can be encouraged
- Same sex domestic abuse/Male rape
- The special concerns of young LGBT+ people and also of older LGBT+ people, particularly those in residential care
- Local resources and support systems

TRANS SUICIDE RATES RISE IN USA



In 2023 alone, an estimated 508 anti-LGBTQ+ bills were introduced in 49 states in the USA, with gender-affirming care, access to toilets, participation in sports, and changing gender markers on official documents all on the line for trans people.

States in the USA that passed anti-trans laws aimed at young people have had a "very sharp" rise in suicide attempts by transgender and gender-nonconforming youngsters.
