GO MAD! Pc admits making up glue attack

two teenagers squirted glue into his eyes and pushed him into a canal admitted to colleagues yesterday that he had made up the story.

Pc Stephen Thorne, 32, needed surgery at Southampton General Hospital to save his sight after what was described as an "unprovoked and malicious" attack on him while he was on plain clothes duty in Hungerford, Berks, two weeks ago.

But yesterday Thames Valley Police said in a statement that Pc Thorne was suffering from depression. He was re-interviewed about the incident after briefly going missing from his home at the weekend.

A spokesman said: "It now appears that this was a symptom of his problems and he has admitted to making the incident up."

Police treated the attack on their fellow officer as attempted murder, and Pc # 3 Thorne's picture featured prominently on television and in newspapers. He had been detailed to watch Hungerford High Street after a spate of burglaries, and said he was attacked by two "scrawny" teenagers he approached.

He had to swim to safety across the Kennet and Avon canal, raising the alarm from a phone box after his radio was damaged by the water.

When officers spoke to him yesterday, he said he had put the glue on his eyes himself. He was medically examined at Newbury police station, and is now on sick leave.


# LATER ....

# JUST A BIT OF EXUBERANCE



9th Oct 94— In terms of insurrectionary demos the occasion didn't amount to all that much, locked up in hyde park on a sunday afternoon the fluffies had already fluffed a pre-arranged containment exercise before the day had even started. But as for the battle itself the demonstrators did well for themselves for a change. Several thousand demonstrators fought with pride and successfully held the police at bay for several hours and made the police look like fools.

After many struggles that have involved physical confrontation since the early eighties there must now be several tens of thousands of proles who have acquired practical first hand experience of streetfighting in this part of the world. The hardcore of this element no longer fear the police and, having learnt instinctively to recognise when the situation is right, refuse to run away when the riot police charge but stand their ground and fight them, or otherwise go round the cops and attack shops. This element, "the same 2000 troublemakers every time" according to the police spokesnerd (the number went way beyond 2000 years ago), also understand the fundamental yukiness of the fluffies. It is not that the fluffies are "nonviolent" or even oppressively moralistic and superior in their attitude. "Monviolence" is sometimes an essential tactic in those circumstances where physical resistance would be suicidal. It is that the phenomenon of the fluffy has been cooked up to serve the agenda of controlling and diverting any material struggle on our part into a liberal civil rights campaign under the system, imposing middle class leadership, and shopping us to the liberal-lefty wing of the state.

The real significance of the demo on the 9th of October was that we wrecked, yet again, the credibility of the likes of Tony Benn, Charter 88 and all the rest of the liberal wing of the establishment to mobilise and lead a popular Democratic People power "velvet-revolution" to modernise the british state and make british capitalism more efficient. It is not that the system necessarily wants to mobilise a democratic velvet revolution in the streets right now, it may be content to stick with the right wing conservative regime. But the system would like to have a few trick cards up its sleave just in case the tory \$\infty\$P.CO.

regime becomes unstable and has to go, a Democratic velvet revolution is one such trick card(DEMOCRACY: the dictatorship of a consumerist "majority" and the rule of individual competition under the market). But ever since a few hundred Xtra! readers, anarcho-punks and autonomists started intervening at CND rallies and disrupting other lefty circuses like the peoples march for jobs at the beginning of the eighties, through the mid eighties and through the poll tax, we have consistantly blocked this trick card time after time. This causes the state a small headache as we are restricting one of its possible future escape routes. The state has tried to break us on several occasions, most notably with operation carnaby, but each time we have shown ourselves capable of coming back and regrouping.

Bourgeois liberals love People power, they love a street full of national flag waving, hymn singing, middle class led Democracy demonstrators or a crowd of respectable concerned citizens demanding democratic reforms or civil rights. But the bourgeoisie in general always hate and fear Proletarian power, they loathe open class struggle and the spirit of ludd and swing, they loathe strikers and pickets and working class insurgents who refuse austerity and undermine the economy. The Democratic revolution in italy has clearly failed. It is the first big example of a Democratic revolution in the "new world order" era visibly and blatantly screwing up, class struggle is coming back with a vengeance in italy. Our shouting at boring speakers and tossing bits of torn trot placard over the years may have contributed in a small way to the stillbirth of the Democratic revolution in this country. Forward to the next middle class protest movement against nasty things, we intend to gatecrash and put class struggle and social unrest back on the agenda.

# THE FOUNTAINS ARE COLD AT THIS TIME OF YEAR.



As for this CJB thing itself, the anti crim joss stick bull movement. contains the possible danger of a double trap. It is not just being defensive, it is being defensive about the right to be defensive. It is not just pleading, it is pleading for the right to plead. Choosing the terrain of parliamentary legislation as a focus for trying to bring together diffuse struggles is a bad choice of terrain. Passing laws is their end of the system, it is where they are strong. The terrain where proletarians are strong is the terrain of refusing to work, refusing to pay, refusing to reproduce conservative family and society. Focussing on legislation the initiative will tend to stay with the state while we run the risk of just tagging along reacting defensively. Simply carrying on with the activities the bill is supposedly dealing with like squatting and travelling while ignoring the law is being suggested by some as the best form of resistance. But this isn't really any use. At best this course of action just leaves us suspended in a dispersed limbo. But if the authorities go ahead with actively enforcing the bill and the enforcement has any degree of success then this course of action just means we are losing.

One part of the anti CJB movement has actually become a soft coppart of a pincer movement helping to enforce the CJB itself! Some fluffy activists are already planning ways of complying with the technicalities of the law before the law has even come in: In this respect the anti CJB movement has a lot to answer for, it is stirring up defeatist fear in advance of a state attack. The government may even be quietly pleased that the protest and civil liberties movement have helped "concentrate the mind", focus attention on the government's spanking shiny new law and

have helped restore fear of the law among some people.

So where is it all leading? What with genetic engineering, supercomputers, smart electronic ID Cards, total video camera surveillance, barcoding babies.... What are they going to do with us all now they've got all this powerful technology to play with? Is it the end? Is the class struggle doomed? Have they finally won? Are we about to be exterminated? Are the Daleks invading Earth?

Totalitarian technology has been around for years it isn't "new". In fact you could say the technology for a totalitarian system has always existed in the form of a stick to bash someone on the head with. The technology to control the population has existed since the first chief invented the first club and the first chain and the first fence. And the best form of surveillance up until today is still the Mark I human eyeball. In the ancient world millions of people lived in slavery. The ancient world did not have surveillance cameras or computers. Their workfare schemes were also a lot more invigorating than those of today: think of the weight of all those stones that had to be pushed and shoved to make all those pyramids!! Today there are at least ten cameras watching me shopping in Sainsburys but I still get to pilfer the peppermint cremes and the miniature cheese (they didn't have those in ancient times). I'm still idling my time away as a prole of leisure and they still haven't actually got round to putting me on community action painting community wall murals for a giro plus busfare; There are at least a million or so not too unlike

The serious point here
is that there is a paradox
that needs explaining: The fact that the
rulers of the world have grown richer and
more powerful than ever before in human

history, have fancy electronic gizzmos and are also winning almost every overt clash in the class struggle doesn't automatically mean that the proletariat as a whole on average are always suffering worse physical oppression or even exploitation than in previous points in history.

It seems the world's ruling elite (the U.S. government and its western "allies", the top nuclear armed military, the super rich top capitalists, elite scientists etc...) have accumulated and are continuing to accumulate such a vast amount of capital and technology that, like the rulers of ancient Egypt, they may now be in a position to entrench themselves in a position of unchallenged leadership for hundreds of years. A sort of high tech neofeudalism. Unless they are already suffering from a severe internal crisis it will not be a realistic possibility for those below them to physically overthrow them in a brief revolution or insurrection. In a more drawn out struggle or a stalemate. time is more likely to be on their side. Even if there is a big economic crisis, social breakdown, natural disaster,

insurrection, social revolt or plain common-or-garden chaos in certain parts of the world, the ruling class can sit tight in its bolt holes, survive comfortably and stoically outlive such events. The temporary loss of control doesn't necessarily threaten them as an elite, they can maintain their centre and their machinery intact until such time as they can reassert control and normal business can resume. In the meantime, in the situation of revolt, no-one is able to organise a credible sophisticated alternative that can endure.

Capitalism as an economic system certainly contains "contradictions", a "class struggle", a "crisis", but it always appears able to stay several steps ahead of these problems. Capitalism is certainly not "decomposing" like the nerds form the International Communist Current insist with their slavish worship of orthodox

Marxist decadence theory. To the contrary capitalism looks stronger and bigger than ever before.

But the human population is bigger than ever before, the proletariat is bigger than ever before. Although the new world capitalist order looks like achieving a sort of status of indefinite invincibility, there is still economic crisis and social revolt and class struggle and natural disorder/ breakdown and so on.... The ruling class may be strong enough to insulate themselves from these things and be unthreatened by them but they will still affect us in our daily lives. The classical obsession of "smashing the state" and overthrowing the establishment doesn't have much viability or relevance anymore (capitalism is "smashing the state" itself!), neither does the Bolshevik agenda of overthrowing the state to set up a new state under a communist party led by professional revolutionists-cum-bureaucrats to impose a "dictatorship of the proletariat". The struggles that will be of use to us will be those about our quality of life, mutual aid, building and reinventing our own community, resisting the economy when we are in a position to do Traditional forms of communal struggle become more difficult with the new conditions imposed by capitalism, but these new conditions sometimes create the possibility for the reinvention community: subversion of computer bill-

boards, radical socialising, turning Job Club into down the pub club.... "struggling to commute to work" during rail strikes via the pub!

So if we are entering a new era of near endless unchallenged rule over the whole world by the new world order then what struggles make sense? I think it will help to look at struggles over the last few decades and work out where we really are being defeated but also work out where we might actually be winning a bit! It is sometimes argued that the proletariat across the world has been living under constantly deteriorating conditions since the early seventies and the oil crisis. Everything wasn't all booming up to the beginning of the 70's and everything hasn't all been miserable ever since. It needs to be explained, for instance, why wages were rising in this country, and quite a few other places too, substantially above inflation until the end of the eighties. Right at the beginning of the eighties the miners scored a notable victory when they threatened a big strike. Thatcher at that point had to back down immediately and do an embarrassing U-turn. Even at the beginning of the eighties, several years after the miners' strikes of the early 70's. the state still wasn't prepared enough to do full scale battle with the miners, they had to wait until 1984 before they were ready.

There is a sort of "martvrdom" effect with some strikes in that a particular group of workers who strike may be defeated and punished themselves but the system is still forced to indirectly make marginal concessions or slow down attacks for workers as a whole because that particular group of workers put up a fight. It might be argued that one aspect of above inflationary wage rises in the mid eighties was due to other groups of workers temporarily being "paid off" to keep them quiet while important militant groups like the miners and printworkers were picked off. Elsewhere in the world powerful successful strikes were occurring.

rail strike could be looked at as a defeat because the signal workers one way or another are likely to be punished/pushed into individual contracts/ sacked and replaced or even not replaced as the industry is torn up. But in Kamikaze terms workers as a whole may still have made gains from this situation such as informal stayaways, pegging of railfares? damage to capitalist economic "recovery" (offensive).

Apart from industrial struggles I think there have been several areas of informal struggles which can be regarded as partial "victories". I always get in to trouble for saying this but I still think things like the revolt against housework and domesticity and the breakdown of the institutional nuclear family in large grown, represents a positive step forward. I don't think this is just a question of decadence/barbarism but is also a product of class struggle since the early sixties. It

#### infantile

has been argued that the revolt against housework and the role of housewife just meant growing numbers of young women being relocated into low paid factory work and office work instead in the sixties and seventies and holding back male wages which would have risen more than they did. But even if this is true I would argue it was still a gain. As well as at last getting paid something rather than nothing there was also a big rise in social security expenditure which has increased overall on the long run for the last few decades. Mass unemployment as a deliberate weapon was first emerging in the mid seventies but was used full scale from the beginning of the eighties. It has proved a bit of a double edged sword for the system. In the mid eighties and again today many unemployed are proving difficult to push smoothly into the new jobs. The "revolt against work" has succeeded undermining the strict work ethic and work culture, it has helped to provoke all the cattle prods like workfare. workfare too can backfire if people just become institutionalised painting the grass green rather than competing and being mobile in the real economy. In fact quite a large number of proletarians in this part of the world have shown a remarkable resilience to being more "flexible" in the labour market in recent years. They have resisted the threat of "supply side measures" ... benefit cut off! by threatening the social peace, threatening to leave the labour market altogether. entering into the "underground economy" or even creating underground community, mutual aid and so on.

#### TOTAL CRAP

It is not just a question of the system having the physical technology at its disposal to do this, that or such and such, it is also very much a question of whether the system feels it desirable/necessary to

sectors of society, which has definitely impose these measures en masse in practice. I think the leading criteria the system uses to decide these things at the moment is still the basic capitalist law of value ("will it make a profit?") and I think this will be so for at least the next five vears. Eventually though I think it is

> leading to a high tech, surreal(?), domesticated home entertainment/torture Barbarism. What might happen is one small group of capitalists, or just a single capitalist! could finally "win" the ultimate victory in the market and be able to buy out/wipe out the whole market. They would them be able to impose their own fantasy anti-Utopia on the world. If Murdoch "wins" then the whole world becomes a T.V. studio with all of us being brutalized live on T.V. or if the Saatchi's "win" then the whole world becomes an art gallery and we'll be massacred and exhibited as a piece of conceptual art...


#### PROLETARIAN PICNICS AND SUBVERSIVE COCKTAILS

There are big problems with trying to forecast more than a few years ahead especially with the speed and scale of the way things are changing at the moment. It is not just that we don't really know what the long term outcome is going to be, it is also that there are huge amounts of disinformation, propaganda and straightforward marketing hype being pumped out about the nature of the changes that are about to take place, particularly with something like this so called information superhighway they are keen to promote. With economic forecasting, capitalist economists admit that beyond two years in advance, accurate forecasting starts to fall down and anyway 50% of economic "forecasts" are just planted propaganda to try and influence economic behaviour/ prices of various things/investment in various countries etc.

If you look at the system purely in terms of the cold technology at its disposal this rapidly leads to paranoia and despair. The system has had the atom bombs to blow us all up since the 1940's.... but it hasn't done so! I'm still here, I'm still alive and I even enjoy myself from time to time. Just because the system has the technical



ability to impose something it doesn't mean it is in its interests (economic or otherwise) to impose it. Yes of course all our telephones are now tapped but there is no need to be too paranoid about it. Every day millions of telephone conversations take place. There is no way they can monitor every single phone call in serious detail and, not only that, follow up all the



information and leads about naughty activity that they have. have computers that can recognise key words like "bomb" and alert the security people to particular phones and conversations. Soon they may have computers that can understand whole conversations but it still doesn't mean the system is able or even inclined to physically follow up every naughty phone call, much of the time they just haven't the energy or couldn't be bothered. If every person who commits an offence or is a little bit of an armchair subversive were dealt with and sent to prison then society would be like a fordist factory working to rule, it would grind to a halt!

while advanced technology involves a tendency towards more control it also involves a counter tendency towards decontrol. While there is more telephone tapping there are also more telephones! and there is far more telephone traffic than ever before!!.... more Capitalist growth and development lead to more control. But sometimes it can lead to the side effect of more things that need controlling. Despite technology, the basic

principle for petty law enforcement remains "bust a certain percentage to try and frighten the rest" for the time being.

How is this information superhighway directly going to intrude into my life? - I don't even have a telly!! How are they going to deal with hopeless drongo cases living in the stone age like me? I have been wondering if they will eventually be forced to give the unemployed FREE interactive telly sets and FREE computers to force us into the system. Instead of the social wage; the FREE social colour telly and social computer with modem etc ha! ha!

Some future predictions we can make include an almost certain growth in the prison population as the system tries to "lock up the revolution". There is not going to be any return to real "full" employment in real jobs. As surveillance increases those struggles which are still viable will have to come more out into the open. This means they will take on more of a foot dragging and non cooperation type of character, leading to punishment and martyrdom for some but temporary concessions for others. More stupid laws, more lawyers!! A growth in self induced health problems: As people are unable to find an external escape route from the system they find internal escape routes instead....drugs, schizophrenia, self mutilation, over eating, the bottle...

The collapse of state socialism/state capitalism has not led to the collapse of the sabotaging ability of the lefty parties and unions against us. The trade unions in particular have not disappeared or become irrelevent to class struggle. Unfortunately they have displayed in the rail strike they are as menacing as ever in their ability to act as an arm of capitalist discipline in the workplace. In the future they will continue to be used as a weapon to prevent a mass social strike.


On the optimistic side, in place of "praise marx and pass the ammunition", today it is more a question of "praise marx and pass the brandy bottle". We can see the advance of collective radical hedonism (as opposed to isolated consumer hedonism), communitarianism, carnival and festival, and sexual revolt as methods of resistance. The technically oppressive conditions that now surround us and the apparent unassailability of the ruling elite are giving lifestylism a funny sort of last laugh. It is increasingly a situation of our own communities and our own daily lives at work and at home being the only level where struggle has much use. This doesn't mean we ignore the overall design in the system or reject organised struggle against it. But it means this struggle is for today, not for some grand abstract ideal system. If the battle of ideologies and grand utopian designs has been "won" outright by capitalist democracy then there is no point any more struggling on a model of revolution based on some ideological programme for the future. There is unlikely to be a successful insurrection to construct a visionary utopian scheme, revolution is here and now. Communism is a form of practise in struggle. Organising with other proles who share the same common aims and common interests, the practical struggle for us will be the reinvention of genuine community amongst ourselves and the practising of mutual aid.

The current politico-economic strategic game plan we are following at ARMCHAIR involves helping set up a FREE mutual aid scheme locally as part of a movement of such schemes (see "The Free Box"), a consumer strike (buy as little as possible and throw away the telly!), and holding on until the last giro ever. We are also contributing to the spreading of revolutionary propaganda by helping to run bookstalls at gigs and events and such like, with other comrades, and joining in with class struggle prisoner support efforts.

However there are indications that the short term skilled unemployed may actually become more pampered in the future to keep them more mobile, versatile and attractive in the skilled jobs market.

We are still computer illiterate here at ARMCHAIR. If we are going to learn skills to be exploited by future employers then we insist they

I sometimes used to wonder why the state never outlawed or clamped down on the anarchist movement in this country over the years. In cynical moments i have come to realise it is because the anarcho market place does such a wonderful job generating millions of pounds of business for the british economy, acting as a source of new ideas and material for the fashion, design and music industries. Not to mention, of course, the armies of sociology lecturers, academics and the like who



wouldn't be where they are today if anarchism hadn't provided them with miles and miles of anarcho-trivia essay writing material. The anarchist scene has been a convenient alternative career springboard for those unable to fit into a more conventional career structure. It makes me annoyed to see so much energy put into the anarchist movement by sincere comrades which is so easily ripped off by the entrepreneurs and spivs lurking around the place, leaving comrades burnt out and demoralised. Has anarchism become the avante guard of capitalism? Indeed is Anarchodemocracy even becoming an official ideology of the system as disillusionment with formal parliamentary democracy spreads? Will Anarchist-capitalism be overtly trumpeted as the next stage in privatisation?

"Recuperation!" some may cry, but maybe anarchism only has itself to blame as it has always been a muddled and weak philosophy. It begins on a negative demand for "no government" or "no authority". This in itself doesn't actually mean much, nor does it necessarily contain any positive material programme. In particular it does not really contain any clear critique of capitalist economics. This has always been one of anarchism's main weaknesses. Anarchism always left the back door open for the market pestilence to sneak in and do its mischief. Today it is the economic force which is in control and governs our daily lives in the form of market capitalism, jobs, money, rent, commodities and so on. Traditional political government and authority are increasingly redundant. The free market capitalist economy is now trashing and dismantling the old institutions of state and bureaucracy that it had once heavily depended on for protection from revolution or chaos. This has left yesterdays anarchism a bit dumbstruck with very little to say except to mumble "er....this isn't quite what we meant by smash the state". Goodbye to the philosophical anarchist wordgames about "no authority". It is time to physically assert a programme of "no economy" and to organise free communism amongst ourselves instead.

In 1990 77%per cent of east germans believed in the benefits of a capitalist market economy, while 90 per cent supported democratic pluralism. But today, according to a made up opinion poll by some bored research assistant, only one third of east germans now feel that democracy is the best form of government. Only two-fifths support the concept of a free market economy and 17 per cent would vote communist at the next election. While two thirds of west germans believe that the existing social system is worth fighting for, only one third of east germans agree. I just thought you might like to know that.

# **Primitive Communism Versus Integral Communism**

Many different, competing, radical groups and tendencies, identify different incompatible societies as 'communist'. I don't want here to identify any 'need' or 'reasons' for forming a communist society. This article is merely an attempt to describe what communism must be.

communism is the name given for a society based on a thoroughgoing community and a communal existence for its members. It is now possible, and has always been, to create small separate communities of a small number of people, which live in a communistic way. For instance it is possible to obtain a farm in rural Britain and work the land collectively, producing food, and perhaps wool and wood for the use of the members of the collective (in fact this is what some 'hippy' communes actually do). This way of life is certainly a form of communism, but an extremely limited and impoverished form. For a start, the more the collective rejects the products of capitalist society (eg machinery, metal tools, bricks, piping ...) the more time they must give over to labour necessary for mere survival. The commune would also no doubt suffer from the personalities of its members, which would have been formed under capitalist conditions, but not altered in a communistic manner by collective class struggle. Worst of all in some ways, it is extremely unlikely that the community would last for any length of time, probably not more than a generation or so. The community would constantly be surrounded by a hostile society, which would encroach directly in the form of tax collectors, police, social workers and teachers. In addition it is almost inevitable that the commune would be at least peripherally involved in commodity production and trade with the outside world, perhaps selling eggs to raise money for taxes or tools. Nonetheless, this hypothetical community would be a form of communism.

As I said before this form of society was always possible. In fact the earliest forms of society were similar to this separatist commune. Of course the first societies were nomadic but this is in fact a relatively insignificant difference. What is determinant about a society is not its location but its social relations. That is why both early nomadic societies and the first sedentary societies are now termed primitive communist. Primitive societies obviously had the advantage that their members had communistic personalities, having known no other form of society. However the primitive communist societies had a similar problem to the modern commune in that they were surrounded by other human societies, which were regularly, if not always hostile. Take note that even Fredy Perlman who idealised primitive societies admitted that they at times traded and warred between each other. Marxists, following Engels, generally argue that the trading between societies gradually encroached on the social life of primitive community so that members traded amongst themselves. Wilhelm Reich argued instead that the physical conflicts between different societies resulted in the amalgamation of victor and vanquished in clan societies (thus destroying their unitary character). Fredy Perlman improbably assumed that primitive societies could withstand any amount of trading and warring between each other but were destroyed by the trade and warfare between them and civilisation. Of course any particular theory of history only interprets the world in one way or another. We now live in a world dominated and transformed by advanced capitalism. We need to work out what kind of society a revolution can now create which will permanently displace capitalism.

The rural commune is obviously a non starter. It can only be short lived and does not displace capitalism but coexists with it. What about a return to primitive society? I believe that any new

primitive communism is also doomed. In a world of 5 billion people it is likely that a return to primitive communism would result in between 10 million and 100 million different societies (guessing at about 100 members in each). As primitive societies have no forms of very long distance communication or travel, each of these societies must be ignorant of almost all the others. As civilisation has vastly increased the human population, it is extremely likely that competition between neighbouring societies would be fiercer than in prehistoric times. In other words a return to primitive communism would result in much more trading and warfare than previously, and to make matters worse, this would be in the aftermath of civilisation, perhaps with many people still with largely capitalistic personalities, not to mention the legacy of weaponry and military technologies. It seems to me that it would be impossible that primitive communism could survive under these conditions. Most marxists would argue that the trade between societies would destroy them, Reichians would argue that the feuding between them would destroy them. Fredy Perlman believed that neither of these factors would be problems. However in his 'vision' of history he argues that primitive societies that had lasted for thousands of generations were relatively rapidly destroyed by the creation in just one place of just one civilised (ie hierarchical, mercantile, class) society. In a world of perhaps 100 000 000 societies, mostly warring and trading, how long would it take a post-civilised society to recreate the essentials of civilisation? Certainly not longer than a generation, probably less than a week.

Capitalist society is based on the division of humanity. The division into opposing classes, opposing genders, states, nations, competing enterprises and industries, competing sectors of the economy. Individuals are also divided against themselves in terms of alienation and the schizophrenic roles we must assume in modern society. Communism, the self-reproducing, post-capitalist society must destroy these divisions; this is why revolution aims to abolish classes and property, why it immediately destroys all existing states and the state as a social relation. It is why communists reject the aim of workers taking over enterprises for themselves and running them for their own benefit (an action which would end in worker managed capitalism). It is why revolutionaries reject as a model a federation of self-sufficient communes (which would hold a particular territory as property, denying it to others). Finally it is why revolutionaries must reject the aim of a return to primitive communism. Primitive communism is certainly the only form of communism which has lasted any length of time. It was in ancient times the best form of society that a revolution could have created (just as the federation of communes model was probably the best possibility before large scale industrialisation). But in modern times, perhaps for a century or so, it has been possible to create a global community, which uses some of the products of civilisation, in transport. communications and production, to unify humanity on a world scale. Such a society is the only way to destroy wage labour, commodity production and the state once and for all.



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
