A big thankyou to everyone who helped make last year's bookfair run smoothly and to you all for respecting the space. This year we have 38 meetings, 90 stalls, an all day cabaret starring assorted ranters, poets, singers and comics; all day film showings and, two kids spaces.

This year the lay out will be a bit different. Stalls will be split between the Great Hall and the Octagon room, which means that there will be more space and the whole bookfair will be wheelchair accessible. This year we have also arranged for some signers and touch typists to be available for deaf comrades who want to attend and participate in meetings. Please contact the info stall for details and for wheelchair lift passes.

This programme should give you an idea of what's on and when, but things never go completely to plan, so please bear with us if the odd meeting, film or cabaret performance has to change on the day. All the up to the minute information will be available at the Bookfair Information Stall and on our website. Please respect the space, and remember that the whole venue, including the outside areas, are non smoking.

Next to the Octagon room will be an all day tea, coffee and snack stall (until 6pm) so people wont' need to treck over to the Curve cafe for a quick drink. The Curve cafe will be available for hot meals, drinks and snacks from noon to 4pm.

There will be meetings in the Skeel Lecture Theatre, one of the small lecture theatres and in rooms in the basement below the Octogan Room, which wil be signposted. The films will be shown in the second small lecture theatre and the Cabaret will be in the 'Drama Room' just downstairs from the Great Hall.

The creche will be signposted, and is in the 'boiler room' which is accessed by going outside the Great Hall and around the back of the building. The 'older kids room' is also in the basement below the Octagon Room in room FBI.

12 noon - Ipm Morris Beckman and the 43 Group

Returning home from a bitter war, Jewish veterans were appalled by the obscenity of Mosley resurrecting his new Nazis with their old hat demonisation of the cowardly black-market Jews. Add the holocaust, and the ferocious "no quarter" assault which utterly destroyed Britain's post war fascists was inevitable.

We will be showing a short film about the 43 Group followed by a talk by Morris and then a question and answers session.

Ipm - 3pm Lucio Urtubia

Fleeing from Spain to France in 1954 Lucio began work as a bricklayer. However, he soon undertook a series of robberies and hold-ups to fund revolutionary causes. He then moved onto falsification of documents. No guerrilla or exile left him without false papers. Uniting with other libertarian companions, he began forging currency to finance numerous groups while attempting to destabilize the capitalist economy. The masterful blow that changed his life was the forgery of Citibank travellers cheques, which damaged the bank so severely that its stock price fell. The stolen money was used, as always, in the aid of guerrilla movements in Latin America and Europe.

This session will consist of a film about Lucio Urtubia's life then an introduction by Lucio followed by a question and answer session.


3pm - 4.30pm John Pilger

He will also suggest a way out of the present ecological crisis and political impasse gripping the world.

Workers Solidarity Movement

In 2008 Andrew Flood spent 16 weeks speaking in 44 North American cities from Miami to Montreal to Eugene to LA. While on tour he had private discussions on organising with hundreds of local anarchists and carried out audio interviews in 17 of the cities visited. Based on

Based on these experiences and conversations he presents an audio-visual talk on the anarchist movement in North America and the new organizations that are currently emerging. The talk will also look at the general conditions face by workers in North America and some of the movements that exist in response to these conditions. 12 noon - Ipm Introduction & Debate on Participatory Economics (parecon)


Project for Participatory Society UK

In "The Origin of the Family, Private Property and the State", Friedrich Engels set out his case that the first human society was communist, was established by a revolution that overthrew primate aggression, and that the oppression of women was a late development in human history. This case has long been dismissed or ignored, but developments in modern science give us good reasons to think that Engels was right all along. Anthropologist Chris Knight will lecture for one hour. There will then be an hour's discussion on the relevance of the theory for today's activists.



Ilam - 12 noon Objectification, Exploitation, Capitalism and the Destruction of the Planet (or, You Can't Eliminate One Hierarchy without Eliminating them All)

Autonomous Radical Feminists

Aim of Meeting: To make clear the connections between the objectification and exploitation of women through the capitalist sex industry, including the trafficking of women and children into pornography and prostitution, and how the sex industry is invading and altering our personal lives, and the objectification and exploitation of the environment, and the creation of artificial material needs by the capitalist system.

This talk is aimed at both women and men, those who consider themselves already to be feminists, and those who have not considered how the aims of feminism connect with ecological and anti-capitalist concerns.

This meeting should achieve a greater understanding of feminism, and how feminist struggles are not a 'minority' interest, but a vital part of the ecological and anti-capitalist movements

12 noon - Ipm Deep Equality - Anarchism in everyday life

Jocelyn Chaplin

This talk, based on Jocelyn's new book Deep Equality(O-books.net), explores the links between hierarchical structures of society and thinking and psychological problems. She describes an alternative structure /paradigm

based on the theory of equalizing rhythms. Jocelyn shows how the new paradigm can be danced with in daily life, and on street protests, as well as at carnivals and raves.

Jocelyn Chaplin is a psychotherapist, a pagan, feminist, anarchist and a member of the Dionysian Underground. Her other books include 'Love in an Age of Uncertainty'. (Aquarian Press).

Ipm - 2pm Feminist Health

Brighton's Women's Health Collective

A workshop with Brighton's Women's Health Collective launching their new website containing resources, workshop outlines and information and hoping to inspire others. Feminist health looks at how the patriarchal capitalist system affects our health and how we can collectively change this, and support ourselves through learning, sharing information and experiences.

2pm - 3pm What is direct action casework - and how to use it

London Coalition Against Poverty (LCAP) and Edinburgh Coalition Against Poverty (ECAP)

LCAP and ECAP have worked alongside tenants, claimants and others confronting poverty to win concessions from councils, landlords, benefits agencies and employers. We work using Direct Action Casework: a tactic developed to empower those we work with; providing advice, knowledge and practical support. In doing this we attempt to draw out the directly political nature of everyday struggle and fight the issues on those terms. Find out what questions this raises for activists.

3pm - 4pm Anarchists Organising Against Imprisonment

Bristol ABC

This meeting is an open discussion on challenging the State's use of the legal system as a tool of social control, including the incarceration of asylum seekers. We're hoping that people currently working on prison and policing issues can come together to share experiences and tactics, with the aim of working better together in the future.

Weaving a web around London: formating anarchist initiatives where you live


Camden Anarchists Group & Haringey Solidarity Group

Reel News is an activist video collective, set up to publicise and share information on inspirational campaigns and struggles - not just in this country, but across the world, producing a monthly newsreel, made up of a number of videos short enough to use in union and campaign meetings. Issue 15 includes climate camp and climate change, the Smash EDO carnival from Schmovies, a film on the plight of Roma people under the new fascist mayor of Rome, and the latest from the Wembley teachers occupation.

I2 noon - I.30 pm On the Verge

Schnews

On the Verge is the story of the Smash EDO campaign against an weapons factory in Brighton and the attempts to repress it. The same cops who did all they could for arms manufacturers have tried repeatedly to stop it being shown and created more publicity than the film makers ever dreamt of. Bright boys, the cops.

I.30 pm - 2.45 pm Ethel Macdonald - an anarchist's story Chris Dolan

Ethel Macdonald worked alongside Guy Aldred in the anti-parliamentary communist federation in the 30s. A committed anarchist, in 1936 she left Scotland and travelled to Spain to take part

in the opposition to Franco. She became the voice of the Republic on the CNT Radio station of Barcelona and filed some of the first reports of the 1937 May Riots, when 400 people were killed in street fighting in the Catalonian capital. In the crackdown following the events of May 1937 she assisted the escape of anarchists becoming known as the "Scots scarlet pimpernel". Later, she herself wascaptured and imprisoned by communist rivals. She later remarked: "I went to Spain full of hopes and dreams. It promised the Utopia realised. I return full of sadness, dulled by the tragedy I have seen."

3 pm - 4.30 pm Five Ring Circus

Conrad Schmidt

This film shows not just the broken promises on resources and sustainability of the 2010 Vancouver winter Olympics, but also the widespread opposition and resistance.





We also wanted a creche where children have freedom to explore, discover, express, create and have fun in a safe environment.

The creche welcomes children from 2 years to 8 years. Children under 2 are very welcome as long as their parent or carer attends with them. Extra adults at the creche during the day are a great help - please speak to the creche workers if you are able to volunteer for an hour or two. The creche will be in the "boiler room", the same as last year, which is outside, round the back of the Great Hall. The creche will be clearly signposted.

I I am - 6.30pm Older Kids Space (Room FBI)

For the second year running we are also catering for older children who come to the Bookfair. This year it will be in room FBI which is in the basement below the Octagon Room near the other meeting rooms. The space will be dedicated to kids between 8 and 12 years old. There will be T Shirt painting, board and card games, DVDs, crafts and other activities. Once again, extra adults or older kids are very welcome to come along and help out - please speak to the workers in the older kid's space if you can volunteer for an hour or two.

Join global efforts calling for his immediate safe return

Lovinsky Pierre-Antoine, internationally respected Haitian human rights activist, was kidnapped in Haiti on 12 August 2007. He is a grassroots organizer, beloved by his family, colleagues and community, and a leading advocate for the poor, including street children, teenage mothers and victims of torture. Despite growing international pressure for Lovinsky's return, there has been a wall of silence from governments with influence over what happens in Haiti, and from the UN. We are focussing on Brazil, head of UN forces in Haiti, and on the US, Canada and France which organised the 2004 coup.

Haiti has been in the news recently after further killings by UN "peacekeepers", and riots against food prices. 78% of Haitians live on less than \$2 a day, over half on \$1 a day or less. Ending poverty and human rights abuses, and getting justice, were central to Lovinsky's work and that of his organisation Fondayson Trant Septanm, which cares for victims of the 1991 and 2004 coups in Haiti. For over a decade they've held weekly human rights vigils, which are now also dedicated to Lovinsky's release.

Vigils and other actions take place in the Caribbean Region, Spain, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Philadelphia and the UK, in solidarity with actions called by Haitians. Amnesty International has issued urgent reports for Lovinsky and his colleague, Wilson Mésilien, who has been coordinating Fondayson Trant Septanm in Lovinsky's absence. Mr Mésilien has received death threats and narrowly escaped abduction in November 2007.

What you can do:

- Participate in the weekly Vigil and Fast.
- Urgently write/email/fax the Brazilian Embassy every Wed. Send copies to the Canadian and US governments – all have played a key role in UN forces in Haiti since the 2004 coup. For addresses see: www.globalwomestrike.net
- Sign and circulate the new Lovinsky Petition http://www.PetitionOnline.com/lovinsky/petition.html
- Sign the Open Letter to Latin American governments taking part in the UN mission in Haiti. Ask them not to participate in the UN occupation, resulting in violence and repression of Haiti's people.
- Call a church or prayer service for Lovinsky. Tell your local media.
- Ask your MP to sign the Early Day Motion for Lovinsky's release.

An enormous debt is owed to the Haitian people whose 1804 revolution ended slavery in Haiti, defeated imperialism and made the way for emancipation of those enslaved everywhere, and liberation movements. Haiti gave refuge and support to Simon Bolivar, liberator of Latin America and Haitian troops fought alongside him. Haiti has paid a high price for its victory and solidarity: France imposed a crippling debt forcing Haiti to pay for its loss of slave labour over more than 100 years; the US launched a succession of economic embargos and sanctions, coups, invasions, and dictators.

A tiny elite has profited from the grinding poverty of Haiti's poor majority, including in sweatshops which exploit people already in abject poverty, and by the destruction of Haiti's agriculture, to make way for US rice and other subsidized produce. The spirited and principled determination of Haitian people and their refusal to bend to powerful forces are an inspiration for all working to defend human rights. Lovinsky Pierre-Antoine personifies the Haitian spirit which refuses to submit despite all the odds. We must get him back.
